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As per the suggestion of the Honourable Vice Chancellor, Dr. Ramakrishnan Raman, student representatives from offshore campuses were invited and welcomed to the 48th IQAC meeting.

All the members were taken through the agenda points of the 48th IQAC meeting.

ITEM NO.1

To confirm the 47th IQAC meeting minutes (MOM) held on Friday, 20 September 2024.

The Director IQAC informed that the minutes of the 47th IQAC meeting, held on Friday, 20 September 2024, were presented to the IQAC members and shared via email on Tuesday, 03 December 2024.

Members were requested to provide feedback on the meeting minutes. As no further revisions were suggested, the resolution was passed.

Resolution Item No.1: IQAC: 16.12.2024

Resolved that the meeting minutes held on Friday, 20 September 2024, be and are hereby confirmed.

ITEM NO.2

To review the Action Taken Report (ATR) of the 47th IQAC meeting held on Friday, 20 September 2024.

During the 47th IQAC meeting, the Director IQAC mentioned that the resolutions passed had been communicated to the respective stakeholders for taking actions as per resolutions.

Resolution Item No.2: IQAC: 16.12.2024

Resolved that the actions taken on the resolutions passed at the meeting on Monday, 20 September 2024, be and are hereby noted.

ITEM NO.3

To discuss about the National Education Policy (NEP) related aspects and academic developments at SIU.

Dr. Asmita Dani, Director, Academics, SIU briefed all members on overall NEP-related aspects and academic developments at SIU. The following points covered during the presentation.

1. NEP Alignment and Implementation

• **Philosophy and Approach**: NEP focuses on long-term transformation in education, with implementation as per evolving UGC guidelines. Flexibility is key, allowing institutions to tailor their adoption.



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• Multiple Entry and Exit System:

- Enables flexibility for students to earn certifications at various levels, enhancing employability and education accessibility.
- Policies ensure quality control during re-entry and transfers, including strict CGPA and course mapping criteria.

2. Academic Programs and Courses

• Holistic Development:

- Mandatory courses such as Health & Wellness, Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam, and Environmental Sustainability aim to foster holistic education.
- Indian Knowledge Systems are offered as optional value-added courses to promote cultural understanding.

Course Rationalization:

Streamlining a catalog of 9,000+ courses to retain only relevant and updated content. International experts are involved for comprehensive reviews.

Multidisciplinary Learning:

- Students engage in cross-disciplinary courses, fostering broader perspectives (e.g., Cognitive Psychology, Urban Planning).
- Popular with students, multidisciplinary courses are integrated into NEP-aligned programs.

3. Internationalization

Global Collaborations:

- Programs like semester abroad, dual degrees, and Dubai initiatives (e.g., Study at Dubai program) provide students with international exposure.
- Recent partnerships, such as with Aston University, enhance global learning opportunities.

4. Digitalization and Outcome-Based Education (OBE)

Governance Modernization:

- Online systems for Program Review Committees and BoS subcommittees streamline academic governance.
- o Integration of MOOCs and MDCs ensures contemporary content delivery.

OBE Challenges:

- Efforts are ongoing to standardize and implement outcome-based education policies effectively.
- o Technology plays a critical role in tracking and reporting learning outcomes.

5. Challenges and Insights

Institutional Challenges:

- Aligning diverse disciplines like humanities and engineering under OBE.
- o Balancing resource constraints while maintaining quality standards.



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Faculty:

- o Reliance on adjunct and visiting faculty for multidisciplinary courses.
- Specialized institutions face difficulties adapting to multidisciplinary teaching requirements.

6. Continuous Improvement

- Academic Audits:
 - Regular reviews ensure quality through reflection and adaptation.
- Future Plans:
 - Completion of course rationalization and digitization by 2025.
 - o Continued focus on capacity-building initiatives for faculty and staff.

Mr. Pradeep Bhargava appreciated the work done on NEP adoption by SIU.

Resolution Item No.3: IQAC: 16.12.2024

Resolved that members acknowledged the academic progress and development in the implementation of the NEP at SIU.

ITEM NO.4

To inform about the 'Academic Audit' and 'Administrative Audit' conducted for A.Y 2023-24.

Academic Audit:

Dr. Asmita Dani, Director, Academics, SIU gave an overview of the Academic Audit.

- Academic Audit was conducted during the odd semester, covering 38 institutes and 94 programs (UG, PG, and Executive MBA).
- Focused on Innovative Practices, Deviations, and Observations to promote quality
 education through self-reflection and continuous improvement.

Key Highlights:

1. Innovative Practices Identified:

- Law: Clinical Legal Education using techniques like the Fishbowl, Tabula Rasa, the Socratic Method, mock role plays, and case studies.
- Management: Community engagement through the Samadhan project, benefiting underprivileged communities.
- Technology & Engineering: Advanced assessments like mind maps, poster presentations, and hands-on sessions.
- Health & Dietary Sciences: Millet festivals, research paper writing, and journal clubs fostering scientific inquiry.



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 Design: Sustainable development projects and creative activities like typography using food items.

2. Observations & Deviations:

- Bloom's Taxonomy: Some programs need to improve adherence to higher-order thinking skills in assessments.
- Evaluations: Rubrics and criteria were either missing or inadequately shared, impacting transparency.
- o **Timely Communication**: Internal assessment results were not always declared within the mandated 15-day period.
- Student Feedback and Action Reports: Institutes need to strengthen documentation and act more effectively on student feedback.

3. Governance and System Improvements:

- Enhanced BoS (Board of Studies) processes using the Eduwiz platform for scheduling meetings and generating records.
- o NEP-aligned initiatives include the implementation of a four-year undergraduate program and approval mechanisms for dual-degree programs.
- Rationalized course structures and standardized coding systems to ensure streamlined academic processes.

4. Other Contributions:

- Preparation for launching the Dubai offshore campus, including program structures and IPR-related documents.
- Committees formed to review API processes, define Deans' roles, and rationalize courses, with reports submitted to the Honourable Vice Chancellor Dr. Ramakrishnan Raman.

Recommendations for Improvement:

- Promote cross-pollination of innovative practices across disciplines.
- Ensure consistent application of Bloom's Taxonomy in both teaching and assessments.
- Strengthen evaluation processes by implementing clear, timely rubrics and criteria.
- Enhance timely communication and comprehensive documentation of feedback actions for greater transparency.

Dr. Asmita Dani, shared that external auditors from reputed institutions such as IIMs, IITs, and NBA/NAAC assessors will be engaged during the even semester to provide critical insights and strengthen the audit process. A structured feedback system will also be introduced to collect their scientific input, aligning with prior recommendations for enhancing evaluation practices.



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Honourable Vice Chancellor Dr. Ramakrishnan Raman, shared information on the NBA accreditation process with the members. He informed that the audit for select programs was successfully completed, meeting the mandate to accredit 60% of technical programs in engineering and management.

MBA programs from SIBM Pune, Bangalore, Hyderabad, and Nagpur, along with selected engineering programs, were audited, while SIBM Noida was not eligible due to its recent establishment. All audited programs received accreditation, with most valid for 3 years until 2027, and the Mechanical Engineering program at SIT Pune receiving a 6-year accreditation.

Honourable Vice Chancellor Dr. Ramakrishnan Raman also highlighted challenges faced during the process, including varying expectations from Central NBA audit teams despite standardized rubrics. To address this, experts from reputed institutions are being engaged to enhance compliance with standards. He further shared that the next phase, planned for 2025, will include 5-6 additional programs, ensuring the 60% accreditation target is achieved within three years.

Administrative Audit:

Dr. M.S. Shejul, Registrar, SIU, provided an overview of the process and key takeaways from the Administrative Audit.

Audit Process:

- Comprehensive review of audit formats to ensure alignment with statutory council norms.
- Scheduling and conducting audits through a systematic process, including external member participation and approval from the Honourable Vice Chancellor Dr. Ramakrishnan Raman.

Audit Teams:

- Formation of dedicated committees for auditing main campus constituents and departments, as well as off-campus locations.
- Assignments included a total of 29 constituents and 14 departments on the main campus, and additional audits at off-campus centers in Nashik, Bengaluru, NOIDA, Hyderabad, and Nagpur.

Observations:

- Well-defined organizational structures ensuring effective functioning and alignment with institutional goals.
- Active implementation of policies with documented compliance in both hard and soft formats.
- Adoption of e-governance platforms for key operational areas such as admissions, examinations, and student information systems.

Areas for Improvement:

- Addressing manpower shortages across some departments.
- Initiating strategies to mitigate admission shortfalls in specific constituents.
- Enhancing the mechanism for periodic policy reviews.



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Actionable Outcomes:

- Preparation of observation reports for submission to University Authorities.
- Recommendations for continuous quality enhancement and compliance.

Resolution Item No.4: IQAC: 16.12.2024

Resolved that the members acknowledged the process of the Academic and Administrative Audit, noted its key observations, identified areas for improvement, and outlined actionable outcomes to enhance institutional quality standards while commending the efforts undertaken by SIU.

ITEM NO. 5

To inform the members regarding the conduct of the Performance Appraisal Report (PAR) for the AY 2023-24.

Mr. Narender Singh, Head of HCM (Central HR), presented the Performance Management System (PMS) at Symbiosis, governed by Chapter 6 of the Human Resource Policy Manual.

PAR is mandatory for all full-time employees who have completed at least six months in the review period, with distinct review periods for non-teaching and teaching staff.

Procedure: The HR Portal hosts a dedicated PMS module. Chief HR issues notifications detailing mandatory PAR forms, guidelines, and timelines, with separate notifications released in January and April for non-teaching and teaching staff.

Self-Appraisal: The process begins with self-assessment via the API form in the Faculty Management System. Teachers upload data on classes, student feedback, and research publications as part of their self-appraisal.

Assessment and Review Roles:

- Assessing Officer (AO): Immediate reporting manager evaluates the PAR.
- Senior Technical Officer (STO): Focuses on technical staff reviews.
- Reviewing Officer (RO): Superior officer reviews assessments by AO.

Performance Appraisal Review Committee: For administrative and teaching staff, the committee includes nominees from the Board of Management (SIU), Advisors, Deans, the Registrar, and Chief HR (Member Secretary). The committee ensures alignment with institutional goals and vision.

Composite Scores and PAR Completion: PAR grading is based on composite scores calculated by RO inputs. Completion requires endorsement by AO and RO, with employees confirming their submissions online.



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PAR 2023-24 Outcomes:

- Non-Teaching Staff:
 - o Eligible: 2,039 (Grades: A = 805, B + = 534, B = 374, C = 211, D = 1).
 - o RO recommended for promotion: 628; PARC approved: 145.
 - o 121 faced promotion committee; 110 recommended for promotion.
- Teaching Staff:
 - \circ Eligible: 908 (Grades: A = 386, B+ = 241, B = 178, C = 103, D = 0).
 - o RO recommended for promotion: 203; PARC approved: 41.
 - 36 received promotion committee recommendations.

Ms. Kanisha Raina raised questions and suggested potential improvements related to **Bell Curve Distribution**, **Merit Budgeting**, and **Promotion Gap** during the discussion.

Resolution Item No.5: IQAC: 16.12.2024

Resolved that member noted and appreciated completion of PAR for A.Y 2023-24.

ITEM NO. 6

Presentation on innovative practices and quality initiatives adopted at SIU by different institutes and departments.

Symbiosis Centre for Management Studies (SCMS), Noida

Dr. Nidhi Phutela, Director of SCMS Noida, presented on quality initiatives, academic innovations, and best practices of SCMS, Noida. The session focused on feedback mechanisms and objectives to enhance institutional excellence.

1. Quality Initiatives in Academics

Dr. Nidhi Phutela presented the quality initiatives undertaken for the academic year 2023-24. Highlights included:

- Innovative Teaching Pedagogies:
 - Sustainability Studies: Students engaged in projects related to sustainability to enhance their awareness and practical understanding of environmental issues.
 - o **Microfinance:** Research and analysis on self-help groups and microfinance institutions to foster financial literacy and community engagement.
 - FSA (Financial Statement Analysis): Practical application of the CMIE Prowess IQ
 Database for extracting and analyzing corporate financial data.
 - Consumer Behavior: Collaborative Online International Learning (COIL) Project with Florida International University, focusing on "Cross-cultural perspectives in advertisements: A reflection of culture and values."



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Skill Enhancement Workshops:

- o Value-Added Courses (VAC) on Fintech and Data Analysis for decision-making.
- o Guest sessions conducted by corporate experts to provide real-world insights.

2. Student Feedback

- Feedback was primarily gathered through LinkedIn posts made by students.
- Observations highlighted the students' positive reception of the initiatives and their perceived impact on academic and professional growth.

3. Best Practices

Dr. Nidhi Phutela elaborated on the integration of academics with corporate and global exposure. The following practices were showcased:

- **Business Analytics Trade Show:** A platform for students to present data-driven insights on various business problems.
- Collaborative Virtual Industry-Based Project (CVIBP): Joint projects with industry partners to address real-world challenges.
- Project with Social Impact Safe Highways Challenge: Students designed solutions to improve road safety and mobility.

Symbiosis Centre for Nanoscience and Nanotechnology (SCNN)

The second presentation was delivered by Dr. Akash Fulari, Assistant Professor at SCNN, who provided a concise overview of the following points.

Introduction and Vision

- Established in September 2017 under Symbiosis International (Deemed University).
- Focus areas include Future Energy, Sustainable Environment, and Healthcare Technologies.
- Conducts advanced research in nanomaterials and point-of-care diagnostic devices for healthcare improvement.
- Partnerships with industries to enhance surgical precision and cost-effectiveness.
- Community engagement to develop technologies tailored to societal needs.

Key Statistics (2017–Present)

1. Publications:

- o Total: 94 (38 with international collaborations).
- Contribution by SCNN members:
 - Dr. Atul Kulkarni: 75
 - Dr. Akash Fulari: 2
 - Others: Contributions vary across members and postdocs.

2. Patents:

o Total: 16 (7 in healthcare, 7 in engineering).



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Contribution: 20% of SIU-granted patents.
